

Information on Health Care and the Wellness Center at Camp Wright

- A physician, nurse or EMT is on duty at all times when overnight camp is in session
- A local physician oversees care in the Wellness Center and reviews our standing orders before the start of each camping season
- All visits to the health center are logged by the care provider
- Program staff are certified in First Aid and CPR
- Parents will be contacted at the discretion of the on-site health care provider and if
 - a camper requires the immediate attention of a physician, hospital or urgent care center
 - an illness requires a camper to reside in the Wellness Center for 8 hours without resolution of symptoms
 - a camper makes repeated visits to health center for the same complaint
- Health care staff and camp administration will contact parents before seeking treatment for campers with non-emergent medical needs
- Most campers requiring a physician's care are taken to the Queen Anne's County Emergency Center in Queenstown, MD. This includes non-emergent visits.
- Health care costs and prescriptions will be paid by Camp Wright at time of treatment. Parents are responsible for these costs and will be billed by Camp Wright
- All medications prescription and non-prescription are required to be kept under lock and key in the Wellness Center, this does not include emergency medications including rescue inhalers and Epi-Pens, which require specific physician's orders
- Camp Wright has standing orders for many commonly used over-the-counter medications (see health form for more information). These medications do not need to be sent to camp
- All medications to be administered at camp must be brought to camp in their original containers with doctor's orders for the medication including allergy medication and vitamins. Please plan accordingly.
